



We are genetically wired to be in nature but this generation of children spends less time outside while at the same time experiencing deteriorating mental and physical health. Luckily, we know that a key solution is to adopt a more active lifestyle as a family which includes heading outside and rediscovering nature in your neighbourhood.

For the past 20 years, NatureKids BC has made it easy for families to reap the many benefits of a healthy nature-oriented lifestyle by making nature accessible and exciting. Thank you to our many volunteers, donors and members for helping us connect families with nature right where they live through educational events, stewardship activities and wildlife observation. We couldn't do this without you!

### Exploring and Learning about Nature:

- More than 900 young members ages 5-12 years from 24 nature clubs had 3000 individual outdoor adventures.
- They submitted 30 completed Passports to Nature (180 nature outings) and received great prizes in return.
- We currently enjoy supporting 566 family membership (1900+ children and adults).

### Community Involvement:

- Enthusiastic volunteers contributed 8,500 hours to connect children and families with nature.
- With an in-kind value of \$115,000, this is equivalent to 4 additional part-time staff members!
- 49 nature club leaders organized 200 monthly Explorer Day adventures in 33 communities across BC.
- 77 nature mentors from the community shared their nature knowledge with children and families.

#### Stepping up for Nature:

- Our members took part in several citizen science initiatives including the Christmas Bird Count for Kids, the Great Backyard Bird Watch, and our Bat citizen science project.
- More than half of our clubs participated in the Bat citizen science project and so did schools and community groups.
- 20,000m2 of land was improved through stewardship activities, 650 native plants, trees or shrubs planted and 31 bird, bee and bat boxes installed or renovated.

### President's Report 2019

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the founding of the NatureKids BC organization. With the maturation of the organization, the mission continues to be relevant and critical for today's children and their families, both in terms of their present emotional and physical well-being as well as the future of our wild species and spaces. The board and staff continued the important strategic planning process for determining the direction of the organization in the next five years. There were multiple leadership changes at the board level and in the Executive Director position. The advantage of the model implemented by NatureKids BC with our programming offered by volunteer club leaders and nature mentors and our magazine, NatureWILD, written and edited by volunteers, is that both our Explorer Days and publication continued to be offered to our members unimpeded. We thank members, volunteers, donors, and other stakeholders for their patience during this period of transition.

Volunteers, board members and staff alike are drawn to support the organization often due to a personal connection to the mission and their own nature experiences as a child. Thank you to the staff and board members who

supported the organization during a year of flux and were committed to connecting kids and their families to experiences in nature throughout the seasons.

Many thanks to our knowledgeable club leaders and nature mentors who successfully engage both kids and their families in learning about our natural history in BC. As co-leader of the Vancouver club I have witnessed first-hand the intrigue, curiosity, thirst for information and wonder in both children and adults while learning about bats from a partner with BC Community Bat Program in Trout Lake Park and exploring the shoreline in Stanley Park with a volunteer from the Vancouver Aquarium. Learning about British Columbia's biodiversity can occur at any age!

Thank you also to our donors and partners, those individuals, organizations and businesses whose financial and programming support allows us to be able to continue our mission driven work. We are grateful to know that we share common values and appreciate your long standing relationships with NatureKids BC.

- 49 nature club volunteers and 78 nature mentors delivered 200 Explorer Day
  field trips, which included activities as diverse as winter campfires and star
  gazing, snowshoeing, learning about animal skulls, riparian restoration, cleaning
  nest boxes, going on fungi forays, geocaching, wildlife tracking, rockhounding,
  learning about wilderness safety and survival.
- We continued to explore new ways to overcome barriers to participation in nature activities for new Canadians.
- We invited families, clubs and schools to get involved with bat conservation
  citizen science where youth learned about bats, species identification and
  data collection methods. They collected data on the abundance and diversity
  of bats in green spaces in their local area through data collection events and
  were encouraged to get involved in stewardship activities that increased
  bat habitat.
- To help teachers across BC with placed-based material on the natural heritage of BC, we started to offer all teachers in BC a complimentary digital subscription to NatureWILD magazine, something more than 500 teachers now take advantage of.
- The Christmas Bird Count for Kids (CBC4Kids) initiative engages new generations
  of young birders and nature enthusiasts and has been a favourite activity for our
  clubs to get involved with since the event started in Canada.




